

Trauma, Psychopathology, and Violence: Causes, Consequences, or Correlates?

In the 1980s, scholars debated the role of mental illness as a cause of violence. More recently, there has been increased attention to the mental health consequences of children maltreated and youth and adults traumatized by exposure to community violence. The nation has focused on traumas experienced by Vietnam, Gulf, and Iraq war veterans and manifestations of psychopathology and violence. Ten years after September 11, 2001, there remains concern about potential consequences of the World Trade Center attack on children, adolescents, and adults.

The 2011 APPA conference will examine the antecedents, causal relationships, and consequences of trauma, violence, and psychopathology. Although there is considerable research on the mental health consequences of violence and trauma, debate exists about whether symptoms are primarily attributed to the trauma exposure or to conditions that might have predated the trauma exposure. Speakers will discuss research on different types of traumas, traumas occurring at different developmental stages and in different contexts, potential gender and race/ethnicity differences in trauma exposure and consequences, and the contributions of biological and genetic factors in understanding psychopathology and violence. A major challenge confronting the field is to move beyond descriptive studies in order to disentangle causal mechanisms and identify factors to enhance the effectiveness of interventions. Toward this end, speakers will address the methodological and theoretical challenges to understanding the interrelationships among trauma, psychopathology, and violence from the perspective of their own research domains.
